Students in the early childhood pathway can gain classroom experience working in the toddler and preschool rooms at the ESC.

When students enroll in the Early Childhood Education pathway, they can potentially graduate high school with four years of hands-on experience and a handful of college credits. In each of these courses, Ms. Jayne Jones combines lessons in child development with application in a childcare setting. Every day, nearly 80 high school students walk over to the Educational Services Center to attend one of four classes: Principles of Early Childhood Education, Early Childhood Education Curriculum, Early Childhood Education Guidance, or the Early Childhood Education Capstone. They complete projects like planning lessons, designing their own classroom, and more. Then, they are able to put this knowledge to work in either the toddler or preschool classrooms across the hall.

The preschool and toddler classrooms are open to the Brown County community, each of which can hold 10–15 children. High school students spend 2–4 days a week running stations and helping with crafts in order to create a fun and engaging environment for the kids. But that's not all – these courses can also earn the high schoolers dual credit. Completing all four courses provides a significant chunk of the requirements for a CDA (Child Development Associate) license. Even if a CDA is not within their plans, Ms. Jones emphasizes that these classes can benefit anyone who may work with children in the future, including teachers, parents, coaches, and others in similar roles.




